

FACTS ABOUT MARK, THE AUTHOR OF THE BOOK

There are many interesting facts about the author of the book of Mark which are not evident from the book itself. Study the following carefully to get an idea of just what type of man Mark was. This will help you in your later studies in the book:

A. Mark's Early Life:

Mark 2: 13—22

Until Jesus spoke of forgiving the palsied man's sins, the only result of His miracles and ministry was increasing popularity. With this event, there began a second result—questioning. Notice how this continued and developed in the days which followed:

A. The Call of Levi and Its Results: Read Mark 2:13-17

Introduction and Acknowledgement

Mark's Portrait of Jesus as the Son of God was originally a four—volume unit of the Bible Workbook Series by Sarah B. Overstreet, ©1966, revised ©1982. They were written at the specific request of Dr. Glen D. Turner of Wycliffe Bible Translators, for translation into various tribal languages. When the original mimeographed volumes began to be printed, the series title was changed to *Bible Discoveries Series*. It was stated that this course was “Especially recommended for Upper Elementary, Junior and Senior High classes, and for individual study.”

Sarah Overstreet wrote in the Introduction to the Study of Mark:

“To help you begin to learn how to feed yourself from God’s Word, we have chosen *Mark*, the briefest of the four gospels. Its stories are the shortest in the entire Bible, yet they include many vivid descriptive details stressing rapid-fire action. These factors alone would make your study very interesting. But the Person about Whom the stories are written makes them even more interesting. You will ‘see’ Jesus, God’s own Son, in scene after scene, going about His daily rounds of work, serving anyone in need. We believe your discoveries in following His activities will be most rewarding.”

In the Introduction to Unit One, Sarah wrote this in the Preview:

“Each of the four gospels presents a portrait of Jesus. Matthew describes Him as the King of the Jews; Mark sees Him as the Servant of God; Luke as the Son of Man; and John as the Son of God. Each portrait is different from the others because of several factors:

1. The person who made each portrait told every story as he (or the person from whom he learned of it) saw it; and as eye-witnesses in court, their accounts differ, depending on where they were in relation to the event;
2. Each of the writers wrote to a different group of people, and explained each event in a way that group would best understand;
3. Each wrote for a different purpose, and included the events which would best help him accomplish that purpose.”

International Teachers Association (ITA) has taken Sarah Overstreet Midyett’s Bible Workbook Series and retitled them, the Diamond Method of Bible Discovery Series Applied to the Bible Discoveries Series by Sarah Overstreet Midyett . We have kept the units as they are, only we title them books. ITA is honored that Sarah Overstreet Midyett has graciously shared with us all of her materials, including these lessons. Her prayer and ours, “For those who choose to use this series, is that in your hands each volume will become the means of leading your pupils into a knowledge not only of the Bible itself, but of the living Lord Jesus Who is so appealingly presented throughout its pages as the Lord and Savior of mankind.”
